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Greek literature of the Roman Empire has long ago ceased to be treated as the fruit of pure imitation and unimaginative reproduction of literary models from the Classical age. Drawing from the conceptual and methodological agendas of modern fields such as narratology, cognitive studies, and linguistics, classicists have approached with a fresh eye notions related to Imperial Greek literature, such as *mimesis* or *paideia*, while the authors of the Second Sophistic are today seen as anything but lacking originality in the ways they chose themes, moulded their linguistic imprints, and developed their compositional styles.

Nevertheless, a great amount of the Imperial literature still remains significantly unexplored in terms of the ways literary genres evolved at those times and interacted with each other. Although rhetoric has admittedly left its mark on the literary production of this era through renowned sophists such as Dio Chrysostom, Aelius Aristides, Philostratus or Libanius, on the other hand, sundry other literary works have been produced in the form of genres which, although being closely linked to rhetoric, transcend its distinctive features. To begin with, the works of Lucian provide by themselves strong evidence in support of this view. Also, schemes of poetry are appropriated by prose in the hymns of Aelius Aristides, while features of drama are very often absorbed in oratory. The genre of dialogue, which has found its place of honor in Lucian, the multifaceted oeuvre of Plutarch, the distinctive works of Galen, and Imperial Greek historiography mirror the astonishing richness of the multifarious genres that call for further comparative research.

In this line of thought, the organizers of the present conference aspire to focus on how the literary goal-settings of Imperial Greek authors shaped the generic trends and physiognomy of current literary production, and to penetrate more into the various co-existing and, very frequently, interactive modes of writing, in order to shed new light on the generic fusions operated in the Imperial Era on a literary level.
